Pam and Nick have been residents of Rancho Palos Verdes for over 10 years. They have three wonderful children aged 3, 9 and 12.

Nick grew up on the East coast, but settled in Southern California in the early 80s. He received a masters degree in Engineering from USC and is a well respected senior engineer at a major aerospace corporation in the Los Angeles area.

It was that balanced perspective that led her, in 2005, to be chosen as a judge for California's Division of Workers' Compensation. She is the first African American judge in the history of the Long Beach District Office. Judge Pulley enjoys a reputation of being fair to the litigants who appear before her. She has written over 100 opinions, some of which have been cited in legal articles and journals. She credits her success to her humble beginnings, which have allowed her to stay grounded and focused.

Shining Star: Isaiah Thompson

Isaiah Thompson is the six year old son of Mr. Marlon Thompson and Dr. Karol Bowens
Thompson. He is a first grader at Point Vicente
Elementary School, and is a straight "A" student. His other regular activities include swimming, and golf. Isaiah is also highly regarded for his accomplishments in Shorin-ryu Karate, in which he has been train-

ing for over two and a half years. He regularly competes in a multi-state traditional karate tournament circuit, and almost always earns first place honors. Isaiah most recently successfully defended his 3-time first place status at the 2010 Friendship Open Karate Tournament in Corona. He is also very proud of researching and channeling Malcolm X to
