#### Great Grandma Vera's Fudge

2 eggs

I-pound box of powdered sugar

4 oz. baking chocolate

1 cup walnuts

2 Tbs. butter

2 tsp. vanilla

Melt the chocolate and butter in a microwave or double boiler. Beat the eggs, vanilla and powered sugar together, then add to the melted baking chocolate/butter. Mix well. Fold the walnuts into the mix, then dab a big dollop of fudge onto plastic spoons or pour into an un-greased pan and cool. Fudge will be soft and will hold its texture better if refrigerated for a few hours.
