Saturday, March 25th, at the invitation of artist Annemarie Rawlinson, Surfwriters Maria Ruiz, Ildy Lee and KC Johnson viewed Uran Snyder's intensely stark, floor-to-ceiling charcoal drawings adorning all four walls of Muriel Olguin's second-floor studio at The Loft Galleries in Old San Pedro. The group absorbed images, transferred reactions to paper (writing either from an objective or subjective perspective), and then read their impressions to those present. Ms. Snyder asked the writers to forward their work, which would be posted near the art and online. During the month-long exhibit's closing event on March 31st, young dancers danced to the unique sounds of Sharon Corsaro's VocalArt, after which, she read works submitted by various poets.

Anthology in the News

Members discussed the anthology at the March 24th meeting.
Below is a recap of that discussion, along with old and new information.

- **Content and Format**
 - Both prose and poetry
 - Published or unpublished material
 - Sketches, line drawings and photos; black and white
 - 300 pages, approximately 5 ½ x 8 ½ inches (**or 6 x 9 inches**)
 - Soft cover with image or design on front (possibly a photo on back)
 - Font(s): 12-or 14-point New York, Times New Roman, and/or Palatino; black and white
- One or two different fonts may be used in the anthology, but **please submit materials in 14-point Times New Roman for consistency in page count.**
- Each member will be allotted 10 (5 ⅓ x 8 ½/6 x 9) pages or 1200 words. If a contributor does not require 10 pages/1200 words, the balance will revert to a central pool, a "slush fund" of sorts.
- **Submission limit - Poetry, 10 pages; Prose, 1200 words**
- Each section will begin with a brief bio of the author (**no photograph**).
- **There will be a group photograph for those who are interested.** Come to the **May** meeting prepared to be photographed, **if you wish to appear in the photo.**
- **Target Release Date:** September (22nd to coincide with our September meeting date?)
- Submit materials on floppy disk, CD, as an e-mail Word attachment or in body of e-mail to Deborah Paul (dpaul9009@sbcglobal.net). If you cannot submit your material electronically, you may send it to Deborah at 30301 Kingsridge Drive, Rancho Palos Verdes 90275.

Deadline for submissions - Thursday, June 1st

Members preferred not to be limited by a unifying theme for the volume.

Titles were discussed. Suggestions given during and after the meeting include:

The Writing Game, The Writer's Stuff, We Love to Write, Musings from the Heart, Musings of the Write, Surfwriter's Musings, Surfwriter's Graffiti, Graffiti from the Heart, The Writer's Cramp, Writings Embedded, Offerings of the Scribe, Scribe Offerings, Scribble Feats, Scribes of the Peninsula, Scribes of Palos Verdes, Scribes of the South Bay, Surfs Up, A View from South Bay, View from the Heart, Gifts of the Heart.

Anthology in the News

-- Japanese Poet, Bashô --

"Bashô (bah-shoh) is the pseudonym of poet Matsuo Munefusa (1644-94), considered the finest writer of Japanese haiku during the formative years of the genre. Born into a samurai family, Bashô rejected that world and became a wanderer, studying Zen, history, and classical Chinese poetry, living in apparently blissful poverty under a modest patronage and from donations by his many students. In his early 20's he began to compose haiku, the structure of which reflected the simplicity of his meditative life. Bashô infused a mystical quality into much of his verse and attempted to express universal themes through simple natural images, from the harvest moon to the fleas in his cottage."

Here are three of his many haiku --

Even in Kyoto,
how I long for Kyoto
when the cuckoo sings

That great blue oak
indifferent to all blossoms
appears more noble

Sick on my journey,
only my dreams will wander
these desolate moors
