Two Hundred Words About Haiku

Haiku is a form of Japanese poetry with a rich history dating back to the 1400s as haikai no renga. Haiku came into being at the end of the 19th century when the opening verse (hokku) of haikai no renga was made an independent poem.

Haiku consisted of a pattern of approximately 5, 7, 5 "on", the Japanese word meaning "sound", which corresponds to a mora, a phonetic unit similar but not identical to the syllable in English.

In Japanese, (hokku and) haiku are traditionally printed in one vertical line; when handwritten, they may be almost any number of lines. English language haiku are usually separated into three lines with a distinct grammatical break, called *kireji*, typically placed at the end of either the first five or second seven *morae* (phonetic units).

While it is impossible to single out any current style, format or subject matter as definitive haiku, some of the more common practices in English are:

- Use of three (or fewer) lines of no more than 17 syllables in total;
- Use of a season word (kigo);
- Use of a caesura or a punctuation mark to implicitly contrast and compare two events, images or situations.
